With the assistance of our member Paul Crone, we have revised our Hold Harmless Agreements to protect SBYC and its members who are participating in club-sponsored events. There are now three different agreements tailored to an activity and the participants.

The first is titled Sequim Bay Yacht Club (SBYC) Regatta Hold Harmless Agreement and will be signed by all boat skippers and crewmembers participating in, for example, the upcoming Thistle Regatta.

The second is titled Sequim Bay Yacht Club Member Hold Harmless Agreement and will be signed annually by all members who participate in on-the-water activities such as Reach and Row for Hospice, the Saturday Races, Duck Dodge, and any phase of the rowing program. Signing this also protects the owners of boats used for race committee or providing rides on opening day, for example.

The third is titled Sequim Bay Yacht Club Non-Member Hold Harmless Agreement and is to secure signatures of those non-members using our club boat or shells in the learn-to-sail and learn-to-row programs. Any opening day guest going out for a boat ride will also be required to sign this release.

Coxswain's Corner -Don Berger, Frank DeSalvo

Jim Mason of the Rat Island Rowing and Sculling Club (RIRSC) trailered the Joe Rantz back to Sequim and returned to Port Townsend with the shell that RIRSC loaned us while the Joe Rantz was being repaired. A contingent of twelve SBYC rowers (including three from Port Angeles and one from Discovery Bay) assembled last week to accomplish all the work described below.

Repair of the Joe Rantz shell was completed several months ago. However, it took several months and much correspondence between Don Berger and Vespoli USA to finally receive a replacement rigger for the one damaged in the racing incident in Poulsbo last summer. By the way, SBYC insurance completely covered the cost of repair to the shell, cost of the new rigger and two replacement oars. Only one oar was snapped in the incident, but you can't buy just one...like shoes.

We installed the new rigger and the Joe Rantz is now on the dock and back in service. The Admiral was moved to the storage lot until summer when the demand for quads is expected to increase.

Rudy has completed months of repair and refurbishing of the Alden single. It is also located on the dock and ready for service. New oarlocks for the double rowing shell were received and installed during the same work session. The old ones were badly worn and outdated. The new gates are expected to dramatically improve the rowing experience for those using that boat. Think the difference between manual and power steering, if you can remember that far back.

Once again, our rowers demonstrated their commitment to SBYC Rowing with this show of force. We were able to accomplish a lot work in a relatively short period of time, and had fun doing it. We now have an array of boats on the dock that will allow us to accommodate almost any combination of rowers. Now all we need is some slight accommodation from the weather.

Cruising- - Ted Shanks

Calling all SBYC cruisers: sail or power, to journey to Poulsbo Viking Fest and then down to Port Orchard where you can visit the Turner Joy, Admiral McClinton's last command, the Navy Museum or just stroll around Port Orchard, which is a pleasant little town.

The DETAILS:

Arrive in Poulsbo on Friday May 15^{th*}. The main event of Viking Fest is on Saturday (what a fun parade!), but those Vikings are running all over town on Friday, too, as well as vendors and displays. Last year, all of us left a day early, the power boats went to Port Townsend for a fun night on the town, and the sailors anchored in bays along the way. It is entirely possible to run down to Poulsbo in one day.

Depart Poulsbo on May 17th for Port Orchard. Port Orchard has a very nice little party shelter in which we can gather in the evening, right on the guest dock. The town is quaint, but the main draw is to take the little foot ferry across to Bremerton and visit either the USS *Turner Joy*, a destroyer museum ship which was the Admiral Bob McClinton's last command. Some may choose to go to the free Navy Museum, a 5-minute walk from the foot ferry. You may stay just one night and see what you can, or you stay two nights for a more leisurely visit. This marina takes reservations, and the slips are \$40 each plus \$4 for electricity. If you are over 40' there is a \$1 per foot charge. They also charge a reservation fee of \$5 if I make all the reservations at one time, or \$7 for each boat to make their own. We would try to get on the end of the guest dock with the party shelter, hopefully all together.

Departure for Sequim is at the time of your choosing. Those who cannot make it back in one day: Kingston or Port Ludlow are good places to stay. Port Ludlow is about halfway.

Those who cruised on this event last year had a great time, and we look forward to an even larger group of boats this year.

Editorial & Message

Planning on crossing the border and visiting out neighbors to the North this year? A little bit of information on required permits, other than proof of Citizenship, little to none.

IF YOU ARE BRINGING YOUR OWN BOAT FROM THE U.S. INTO CANADA.

The Canadian competency certificate regulations do not apply to non-residents who operate their U.S. registered or documented pleasure craft in Canadian waters for **less than 45 consecutive days.** You must carry proof of U.S. residency, and your state watercraft registration card or U.S. Coast Guard documentation certificate and insurance with you at all times when you are on the water. Canada does require a VHF Radio license, but it is my understanding that it is rarely enforced, if ever.

Be aware that Washington State does require a Boating Certificate for you to operate a boat in US waters if you were born in 1955 or later. **You do not require one if born before 1955**.

You would be able to take the Washington State course on line from BoatUS. It is completely free and approved by Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission, once the course is completed you will be issued a safe boating certificate. 
