

Our next general meeting and community presentation is scheduled for **Wednesday, October 13**, as follows:



- 6:00 6:15 p.m. General Meeting Hendricks's Meeting Room (adjacent to Clubroom)


Come and learn the latest about how the Cascadia Subduction Zone Earthquake and Tsunami may impact you and what you can do to prepare for the event. The presentation is open to the general public. Masks will be required in the Hendricks Meeting Room in accordance with state and county mandates.

Blaine and Keith are the CCFD3 Sequim Operational Area Planners and serve on multiple state preparedness committees. Blaine is also the co-author of the annual newspaper insert "Peninsula Emergency Preparedness Guide". They have been offering Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training for five years and have trained over 680 people. Blaine and Keith are passionate about what they do and offer a refreshing perspective on preparedness.

Blaine and Keith will tell you the facts and the anticipated damage for our area of the northwest. They will also let you know how you can prepare in advance to lessen the impact of this event on your life. The event is coming but is not on anyone's calendar. Earthquakes never are. Even with the most sophisticated warning system available at present, the best expected warning is only seconds ahead of the shaking. Many plans are in the works for recovering from the event, and you will learn about this ongoing work

North to Sucia cruise was a great success! All who went had a blast! Cristina Eppers was one of the PAYC members who cruised in her sailboat. She and her husband Sean are also joining SBYC.

We moved here a year ago to sail more and explore the San Juans, but we hadn't gotten out much yet by August. When we heard that the SBYC-PAYC **North to Sucia Cruise** was still happening we jumped and finally got to do our first San Juans Cruise in our own boat. We're so glad we did! The weather was Perfect on August 10th, making for a fast Strait crossing behind Ken & Andrea Williams in their tug, Tough Guy. We met up with SBYC member and cruise organizer, Dan Currier, in Voyager, Don Coffman in AnaMia, and SBYC Commodore Jerry Fine and his wife, Marian, in Flora Mae for one night in Mackaye Harbor. We made a smooth passage through Cattle Pass the next morning (photo, above).

August 11-12: we stayed in Friday Harbor on San Juan Island. We enjoyed a reciprocal dinner at the SJYC, took the trolley bus tour of the island, enjoyed a few hours exploring Lime Kiln State Park,

did a wine tasting and had a delicious dinner in town. The marina was crowded but we enjoyed meeting several other MacGregor sailors and watching the impressive schools of little shrimp swarming around the dock lights at night. August 13-14: We anchored in Echo Bay at Sucia Island.



This "jewel of the San Juan Islands" is a wonderful spot, and my favorite. It was a bit smoky from





CRUISING NEWS

Ann Elliot and Michael McDonald, M/V Crew's Inn

Mike and I recently returned from cruising throughout the South Sound for five weeks beginning the middle of August. We were surprised how few cruisers populated this area. The weather was warmer than Sequim and quite lovely with only three days of rain. One night we experienced winds in excess of 30 knots. We are extremely safety oriented. In spite of having a very secure anchor set when we arrived, we elected to maintain an anchor watch until 2 a.m. when the winds finally subsided. We were even fortunate to be the only boat anchored in a couple of beautiful bays.

While in Tacoma we enjoyed visiting the Museum of Glass, the History Museum as well as the Tacoma Art Museum, TAM. Finding a spectacular sushi restaurant was a serendipitous gustatory delight. We were pleased to take advantage of our yacht club reciprocity for moorage at a few locations. These moorage opportunities are always on a first-come, first-served basis. Many of the possible locations were already filled when we arrived. We prefer to anchor, but there are times when we want to charge the batteries being plugged into a power source rather than relying strictly on our Genset. We were surprised to learn that there are no laundromats in Gig Harbor where I had hoped to wash clothes. We visited Gig Harbor once before Labor Day and again afterwards. What a difference in spite of being there on the weekends each time. Before the holiday, the bay was packed with anchored boats as well as smaller vessels cruising through the anchorage and a plethora of paddle boats and kayakers propelled by people of all ages and dogs of all sizes. It was great seeing so many folks enjoying one of the benefits of living near the water. After the holiday, we were one of three boats anchored in the big bay. We saw only 2 to 3 non motorized craft being utilized. We were surprised to see a gondola being manned by a gondolier dressed in Venetian style giving visitors a tour of the bay and narrating the sites and offering some history. During one sighting I even heard the gondolier singing an Italian aria! Fortunately he had a nice voice.

Good news, bad news. The bad news is that our vessel exhibited a couple of hiccups. The good news is that the need for service happened this year while we were traveling in local waters. We are also grateful that these things happened where we could get the problems solved in a timely fashion by an experienced marine crew. We want problems that may be lurking on this vessel that is new to us to happen before next spring in hopes that our trip to Alaska in 2022 will be problem free. However, being longtime cruisers we also know that a boat is a boat and issues will be an ongoing part of cruising. Fortunately, we were near Point Defiance where Breakwater Marine is located when the problems occurred. Both times they were able to get us to their dock, resolve the problem and get us on our way the next day or same day. The crew was extremely knowledgeable and professional. We were pleased to find them and will confidently use their service in the future if needed.

We look forward to a time in the future when we can return to this area and visit other beautiful anchorages in the vicinity.
